Mexican presidential candidates square off in debate

MEXICO CITY — Mexico’s four presidential candidates squared off in their third and final debate Tuesday night before the country’s July 1 elections.

Lopez Obrador and Meade sparred over the issue of economic policy, with Meade arguing that the policies of the leftist Lopez Obrador would lead to rising poverty and unemployment. **“We’ve seen this movie before,” Meade said. (1)**

Lopez Obrador said he would try to save the North American Free Trade Agreement. But he also said he wanted to strengthen Mexico’s domestic market and turn away from the export-oriented policies of recent administrations. **“Mexico can produce what it consumes,” Lopez Obrador said.(2)**

Anaya aimed a salvo at President Pena Nieto, pledging that **“there will be a commission to directly investigate the president” (3)** for alleged scandals, including a mansion that first lady Angelica Rivera bought from a government contractor and the unresolved disappearance of 43 college students in 2014.

Independent candidate Jaime Rodriguez rounds out the field, and as usual made the most extreme proposals, such as ending most government hand-out programs. **“We have to make people work,” Rodriguez said. (4) “There are a lot of lazy people who are receiving government aid.” (5)**

All the candidates accused each other of corruption. Anaya made the most startling claims, accusing Lopez Obrador of having granted no-bid contracts to a businessman when he was mayor of Mexico City.

Lopez Obrador hit back, saying: **“I am not a corrupt person like you,” (6)** referring to a real-estate scandal that has dogged Anaya.

Uneasy presidents club convenes at Bush funeral

Washington (CNN). In the cavernous sanctuary of the National Cathedral on Wednesday, President Donald Trump came face-to-face for the first time with his four living predecessors, an encounter occasioned only by a loss to the most exclusive club in American politics -- indeed, in the world.

Trump's election, (1) _____ came after he demeaned and humiliated the family members of three ex-presidents and made racist insinuations about his predecessor, has shaken the traditional fraternity of past and current commanders in chief. He had, until now, avoided any encounters with the collected group, and hadn't spoken at all with three of them. I. _____

For the time he was inside the cathedral on Wednesday, those hurtful slights remained unmentioned, at least out loud. But few watching the men's interaction -- or lack thereof -- would believe a new camaraderie is emerging between Trump and the men (2) _____ served before him.

As he was shown to his seat, Trump reached over his wife to shake President Barack Obama's hand, (3) _____ greeted him with a nod. It was their first interaction since Inauguration Day almost two years ago, and it lasted mere seconds.

Michelle Obama, (4) _____ wrote in her memoir this year that Trump's birther conspiracy endangered her daughters, offered the President a quick "good morning" before turning away and looking straight ahead.

And that was it. Trump did not shake hands with the Clintons or the Carters, seated several seats away, though first lady Melania Trump extended a hand to greet President Bill Clinton, (5) _____ smiled warmly.

The presidents club, by nature, is complicated by past rivalries and future legacies. II. ____ It's impossible to know, at this stage of his presidency, (6) _____ Trump's ultimate role in the club will



be. But he enters the group carrying a long record of dismissive, vitriolic criticism extending well beyond partisan politics.

The tensions between the Bush family and Trump, (7) _____ were a recurring theme of the 2016 Republican primary after Trump belittled GOP rival Jeb Bush, roared back into public view after Barbara Bush died in April. She had



been highly critical of Trump, saying at one point: "He's said terrible things about women, terrible things about the military. I don't understand (8) _____ people are for him."

And she made clear she did not want him at her funeral.

But shortly after her body was laid to rest, (9) _____ it seemed as though her husband's health was failing and his death was imminent, the Bush family

reached out to the White House to inform Trump the state funeral for Bush would be different. **III.** _____

It was less of an olive branch than a sign of the former president's penchant for protocol, a Bush family friend said. The decision also meant (10) _____ the week of Bush's death would be devoted to a celebration of his life and service, not a messy public feud with Trump. "This is a chance for the country to remember -- and learn again -- about 41," a Bush family friend said.

Trump, (11) _____ campaigned as an outsider and has grown accustomed to not being welcomed into several elite clubs and social circles in New York, has indicated (12) _____ he appreciates the gesture.

"The elegance and precision of the last two days have been remarkable!" Trump tweeted. He has maintained a gracious and reverent demeanor this week, including traveling late Monday to view Bush's casket lying in state in the Capitol Rotunda and paying a call to Blair House, (13) _____ the Bush family is staying, on Tuesday. Former first lady Laura Bush and Melania Trump, (14) _____ have maintained warmer ties than their husbands, toured the White House Christmas decorations.

"In this case, I think (15) _____ it is important to show the continuity between presidents, (16) _____ Donald Trump isn't just an individual, he represents the institution of the presidency, (17) _____ 41 held so dear," said Douglas Brinkley, a CNN presidential historian and professor at Rice University.

"So it's very appropriate (18) _____ he's there. My concern is strange tweets in the middle of it, because of all the Mueller investigation things coming out. **IV.** _____

Only five months ago, the President was mocking Bush's trademark "thousand points of light" philosophy of public service during a rally in Montana.



"What the hell is that?" Trump asked supporters in July. "Has anyone ever figured that one out? And it was put out by a Republican, wasn't it? I know one thing: Make America Great Again we understand."

He has bluntly said George W. Bush "lied" about the Iraq War -- hardly a controversial sentiment among many Democrats, (19) ____ Trump was for much of his life -- but he took it a step further while campaigning in 2016.

"Excuse me, the World Trade Center," Trump said, a pointed reference to how the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks took place on Bush's watch. **V.** ____

Trump's most incendiary comments of all come through his inaccurate and racist questioning of Obama's American citizenship. In her bestselling memoir this year, Michelle Obama wrote: "Donald Trump, with his loud and reckless innuendos, was putting my family's safety at risk. And for this I'd never forgive him." **VI.** ____

Still, the presidents club is like family -- members have little say in (20) ____ joins. Indeed, the club runs more on tradition and the forging of personal relationships than on etched rules or guidelines. It's an exclusive gathering (21) ____ primarily convenes to christen a presidential library or to bid farewell at a state funeral, though George W. Bush made a point of inviting all the former presidents, including his father, to meet Obama as he was entering office in 2009.

The services for Bush on Wednesday were the fourth state funeral at the soaring National Cathedral in Washington, with Gerald Ford's in 2007, Ronald Reagan's in 2004 and Dwight D. Eisenhower's in 1969.

Bush "planned his funeral memorial service right to have President Trump attend. But let's be honest -- there's nobody (22) ____ wants to see President Trump at this memorial service that's going to be there," Brinkley said. "But he's going to be there. And (23) ____'s going to be interesting -- people will be looking to see (24) ____ comes up to him, how does everybody act."

"People will have to endure the fact (25) ____ President Trump is there," Brinkley said. "But it's good that he's there."

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE OSCARS

The *Academy Awards*, **(1. casual / casually)** called the *Oscars*, is a formal awards ceremony to honor the best achievements in filmmaking from the **(2. previous/ previously)** year. The Academy Awards, from the nomination and voting processes to the ceremony itself, are overseen by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. The Academy has about 6,000 members and is a **(3. professionally/ professional)** honorary society of people involved in all aspects of making movies.

The first Academy Awards were distributed in 1929 at the Hotel Roosevelt in Hollywood. Cinema has changed **(4. since / for)** then, and so have the categories for awards. **(5. Current / Currently)** there are 24 awards categories presented at the ceremony, with more Oscars handed out for other lesser achievements before the formal ceremony.

Some top categories of Academy Awards are Best Actor/Actress in a **(6. leadingly / leading)** Role, Best Actor/Actress in a Supporting Role, Best Picture, Best Director, Best Costume Design, Best Music, Best Visual Effects, and Best Animated Feature Film.

One of the most prestigious award ceremonies in the world, The Academy Awards ceremony is televised in over 100 countries. Those who love cinema tune in to see how **(7. its / their)** favorite movies and performers fare. Those who love fashion watch



to see what the celebrities are wearing — which is often the **(8. latest / oldest)** in couture with **(9. astronomic / astronomically)** expensive (usually loaned) jewelry.

A film must open in the previous calendar year in Los Angeles County to qualify for the next year's Academy Awards ceremony (the one exception to this is Best Foreign Language Film). **(10. Often / Seldom)**, if moviemakers think they have an award winner on their hands, they'll release a movie in the **(11. last week / next week)** of the year to qualify for the upcoming awards (such as *Silver Linings Playbook*, which released on December 25, 2012 and was nominated for Best Picture and other Oscars in January, 2013). **(12. Even / Conversely)**, the 2009 Best Picture Winner, *The Hurt Locker*, was first released in 2008, but didn't release in L.A. County **(13. as far as / until)** 2009, so it won its Best Picture award in 2010.

In late December, all Academy members receive ballots to select nominees for the next ceremony. For most categories, Academy members vote **(14: unique / only)** for their peers (directors vote for nominees for Best Director, actors vote for nominees for Best Actor, etc.). The exceptions to this are for Foreign Film, Documentary, and Animated Feature Film categories, which are nominated by **(15. specially / special)** committees made up of members across the Academy, and all members are allowed to vote for nominees for the coveted Best Picture award.

The winners for each category are determined by a second voting round, which is opened up to all members of the Academy for most categories.

Here is some fun Oscar trivia:

- Walt Disney won more Academy Awards than any other person, with 26 Oscars (22 for his films and 4 honorary awards).
- Edith Head won more Academy Awards than any other woman, with 8 Oscars (all for Costume Design).
- Katharine Hepburn won **(16. most / more)** Academy Awards than any other actor/actress, with 4 Oscars.
- Meryl Streep has been nominated for more Academy Awards than any other actor/actress, with 17 nominations (she's won 3 times).
- **(17. Only / unique)** three films have ever won all five of the most coveted awards — Best Picture, Director, Actor, Actress, and Screenplay (adapted or original): *It Happened One Night* from 1934, *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* from 1975, and *The Silence of the Lambs* from 1991.
- Tatum O'Neal is the youngest person to win an Oscar — she was 10 when she won for *Paper Moon* (1973).



- Christopher Plummer is the **(18. older / oldest)** person to win an acting award — he was 82 when he won for *Beginners* (2010).
- James Dean is the only person to be nominated for two posthumous Academy Awards, for *East of Eden* (1956) and *Giant* (1957).
- Beatrice Straight holds the record for winning an acting award for the shortest role — in 1975's *Network*, she was on screen for 5:40 minutes.
- Woody Allen has been nominated for 21 Academy Awards, but he's only attended the ceremony **(19. once / twice)** (in a year he wasn't nominated).
- No one really knows how The Oscars got its name. One story is that an Academy librarian saw one of the first statuettes and exclaimed **(20. excitedly / excited)** "it looks just like my Uncle Oscar!" Another story is that Bette Davis named it after her ex-husband, Harmon Oscar Nelson, Jr.

USMCA, the new trade deal between the US, Canada, and Mexico

NAFTA gets an upgrade with new provisions on autos, dairy, and more.

Say goodbye to NAFTA — and hello to the USMCA.



Just before the midnight deadline on Sunday, the US and Canada struck a deal on trade and (1) _____ the framework for a new, revised NAFTA — now known as the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement, or USMCA.

The three countries reached a consensus after more than a year of talks, which (2) _____ after President Donald Trump made good on his campaign promise to renegotiate the North American Free Trade

Agreement (NAFTA), which he (3) _____ the “worst trade deal ever.”

All three countries (4) _____ the new deal — and heaved a collective sigh that disaster of a missed deadline had been averted. Mexican President Enrique Peña Nieto called it a “win-win-win agreement.” Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau (5) _____ North American trade (6) _____ and modernized for the 21st century.”



Trump, of course, also declared victory, calling it a “brand new deal” and “the most important trade deal we’ (7) _____ ever _____, by far.”

“Once approved by Congress, this new deal (8) _____ the most modern, up-to-date and balanced trade agreement in the history of our country, with the most advanced protections for workers ever developed,” Trump said in a speech announcing the deal in the White House Rose Garden on Monday.

New name or not, USMCA (9) _____ quite a “brand new deal,” as Trump described it. It’s basically NAFTA 2.0: an updated version of the nearly 25-year-old trade agreement, with major changes on cars and new policies on labor and environmental standards, intellectual property protections, and some digital trade provisions.

But experts say the changes are significant — even if they (10) _____ quite _____ Trump’s bloviating. “It’s a substantially different agreement than NAFTA,” Richard Miles, director of the US-Mexico Futures Initiative at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, tells me.

The three leaders (11) _____ to sign the USMCA before the end of November. But all three countries must still (12) _____ it.

Congress likely (13) _____ even _____ the agreement until 2019, and it’s possible that power (14) _____ to the Democrats in one or both chambers after November’s midterm elections. If that happens, Congress might be a little more reluctant to give the president a win by ratifying the deal. Since the approval process will take some time, most of the new USMCA provisions won’t go into effect until 2010.

In the meantime, debates in Canada, Mexico, and the US (15) _____ out over the following months about whether these revisions are wins or loses — and whether this new trade agreement is a real improvement on what came before.
